THE HISTORY OF THE POW/MIA FLAG

In 1972, Mrs. Michael Hoff, a MIA wife and member of the National league of Families, recognized the need for a symbol of our POW/MIAs. Prompted by an article in the Jacksonville, FL Times-Union, Mrs. Hoff contacted Norman Rivkees, Vice President of Annin and Co., which had made a banner for the newest member of the United Nations, the People's Republic of China, as a part of their policy to provide flags to all United Nations members states. Mrs. Hoff found Mr. Rivkees very sympathetic to the POW/MIA issue, and he, along with Annin's advertising agency, designed a flag to represent our missing men. Following League approval, the flags were manufactured for distribution. On March 9, 1989, and official League flag, which flew over the White House on 1988 National POW/MIA Recognition Day, was installed in the US Capitol Rotunda as a result of legislation passed overwhelmingly the 100th Congress. IN a demonstration of bipartisan Congressional support, the leadership of both Houses hosted the installation ceremony. The League's POW/MIA flag is the only flag ever displayed in the US Capitol Rotunda where it will stand as a powerful symbol of national commitment to America's POW/MIAs until the fullest possible accounting has been achieved for the US personnel still missing and unaccounted for from the Viet Nam War. On August 10, 1999, the 101st Congress passed US Public Law 101-355. Which recognized the league's POW/MIA flag and designed it "as the symbol of our Nation's concern and commitment to resolving as fully as possible, missing and uncounted for in South East Asia, thus ending the uncertainty for the families Nation." The importance of the league's POW/MIA flag lies in its continued visibility, a constant reminder of the plight of America's POW/MIAs. Other than "Old Glory", the League's POW/MIA flag is the only flag ever to fly over the White House, having been displayed in this place of honor on National POW/MIA Recognition Day since 1982. Passage by the 105th Congress of Section 1082 of the 1998 Defense Authorization Act requires that the League's POW/MIA flag fly six days each year: Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, National POW/MIA Recognition Day and Veterans Day. It must be displayed at the White House, the US Capital, the Department of State, Defense and Veterans Affairs, headquarters of the Selective Service System, major military installations as designated by the Secretary of the Defense, all Federal cemeteries and all offices of the US Postal Service. By law passed in 2002, it must fly year-round at the National Vietnam Veterans Memorial, The Korean War Veterans Memorial and the World War II Memorial. Those American who fly the POW/MIA flag do so to demonstrate their loyalty and sincere dedication to all Prisoners of War and Missing in Action, and to their safe return – both alive and dead.
