**American Legion Food Tent at the Fair:** will take place Tuesday thru Sunday, August 25<sup>th</sup> – 30<sup>th</sup> all day long. This is another fundraiser for the American Legion family and it takes an enormous number of volunteers to prepare and serve breakfast, lunch and dinner every day. Please check with Al Richar if you want to be placed on a crew or stop in at the Post and sign up. Something new this year – we will be serving BBQ chicken on Saturday night because neither Rotary or any other group is doing it this year. The pits are next to our tent so why not cash in? We are counting on you.

**Trumansburg Fair Firemans Parade:** The parade will begin at 5:00 PM sharp on Saturday, August 29<sup>th</sup>. Parade lineup will commence at 4:00 PM. We will form our color guard at the Post at 4:15 and head over to the starting point at about 4:30. Uniforms will be will Legion logo or short sleeve shirts, dark navy or black pants and shoes, and a Legion hat. If you are unable to walk we are hoping to have a flat bed transportation for you. Let’s have a good turnout for this event.

**Post 770 By-Laws Amendment:** The American Legion membership voted unanimously at their June 22<sup>nd</sup> meeting to amend ByLaw Article XIV Trustees – Section 1 which reads as follows: The Post may elect nine trustees, seven of which are American Legion members, and one Auxiliary and one Sons of the American Legion member to serve in accordance with the provision of the Benevolent Orders Law and who shall have the care, management and control of all the temporalities and property of the Post. Pursuant to section vie of the Benevolent Orders Law, after the Trustees are first elected they shall, by lot, be assigned a term of one, two or three years and here after all the Trustees shall be elected for terms of three years. The amendment will add Part A which states: The duties of the Auxiliary and Sons of American Legion members shall be to gather and dispense appropriate information to their units and Board members. The Auxiliary and Sons of American Legion members shall not have voting privileges. By rule, once the amendment proposal has been

made available to the American Legion membership, a vote of acceptance will be held at the next meeting which will be on August 10<sup>th</sup>. The By-Laws were last updated in 2006.

**Walk of Honor:** We continue to accept orders for bricks to be etched and installed among the many that are already part of our "Walk of Honor". Order forms are available near the entryway in the lounge. The purchase of a brick is a meaningful way to honor a veteran.

## An Article of Interest from Bill Parker:

### They paid the price!

Back in September of 2005, on the first day of school, Martha Cothren, a social studies teacher at Robinson High School in Little Rock, did something not to be forgotten. On the first day of school, with the permission of the school superintendent, the principle, and the building supervisor, she removed all the desks out of her classroom. When the first period kids entered the room they discovered that there were no desks. Looking around, confused, they asked, "Mrs. Cothren, where are our desks?" She replied, "You can't have a desk until you tell me what you have done to earn the right to sit at a desk." They thought, "Well, maybe it's our grades." "No", she said. "Maybe it's our behavior." She told them, "No, it's not even your behavior." And so they came and went, the first period, second period, third period. Still no desks in the classroom. By early afternoon television news crews had started gathering in Mrs. Cothren's classroom to report about this crazy teacher who had taken all the desks out of her room. The final period of the day came and as the puzzled students found seats on the floor of the desk less room, Martha Cothren said, "Throughout the day no one has been able to tell me just what he/she has done to earn the right to sit at the desks that are ordinarily found in this classroom. Now I am going to tell you." At this point Martha Cothren went over to the door of her classroom and opened it. Twenty-Seven US Veterans, all in uniforms, walked into the classroom, each one carrying a school desk. The vets began placing the school desks in rows, and then they would walk over and stand alongside the wall. By the time the last soldier had set the final desk in place, those kids started to understand, perhaps for the first time in their lives, just how the right to sit at those desks had been earned. Martha said, "You didn't earn the right to sit at these desks. These heroes did it for you. They placed the desks here for you. Now it's up to you to sit in them. It is your responsibility to learn, to be good students, and to be good citizens. They paid the price so that you could have the freedom to get an education. Don't ever forget it."
