### NEW CIVIL WAR MUSEUM EVOKES OLD DIVISIONS, PASSIONS

In some parts of the country, the Civil War is still being fought. And perhaps nowhere are the aftershocks and viewpoints as evident as in Richmond, VA, where a new museum is attempting to tell the history of the war from three angles. That would be: the Union, the African-American and the Confederacy. The American Civil War Center argues in its inaugural 10,000 square foot exhibition, "In the Cause of Liberty", that each of the three had distinct ideas about freedom. Each side was passionate. Each found justification for its goals in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution. Each suffered many casualties. Some of these concepts bumped into one another, creating more tensions.

### HONOR OUR VETERANS

When in England at a fairly large conference, Colin Powell was asked by the Archbishop of Canterbury if our plans for Iraq were just an example of empire building. He answered by saying, 'Over the years, the United States has sent many of its fine young men and women into great peril to fight for freedom beyond our borders. The land involved is south of Sampson State Park and housed medical facilities serving the Sampson Naval Training Station during World War II.
