**Flags On Graves for Memorial Day:** Anyone wishing to help put flags on veteran's graves please be at Grove Cemetery at 6:00 PM on Tuesday, May 20 at which time we will break up into several groups and put flags on graves. There are several cemeteries which we have assigned other members to honor. If you know of any veteran that does not receive a flag before Memorial Day, please let us know so we may honor all of our veterans.

**Memorial Day Parade, Flag Disposal Ceremony, Observances & Open House:** will be held on Monday, May 26<sup>th</sup> beginning at 9:00 AM. This is perhaps the largest annual observance taking place on the Post calendar. Uniform will be navy or black pants and shoes, Post logo or white shirt, tie is optional and Legion hat. Logo shirts are available free of charge for those members who participate in our color guards. In the event of cold weather, we will wear Legion jackets, or wear your own blue jacket. We will be conducting our flag disposal ceremony while we are in uniform and the attendance of the public is at its greatest. At 9:00 AM we will walk through the flag ritual at the Post; at 9:45 assemble for the parade; at 11 AM ceremonies at the cemetery; 12:30 PM flag retirement at Post 770; and from Noon – 3 PM Open House at our Post. #### POST NEWS

It seems like a long time ago but the first event to be held since the cut off date for last month's newsletter was the Kids Easter Party. Although we were not in attendance, about 40 to 50 kids, parents and grandparents were. Sounds like a good time for all. ...The Legion Birthday dinner proved to be a wonderful event. Following a delicious Roast Beef dinner put out by Cindy and Gary Reckdenwald, Tom & Roberta Stilwell, Lee Agard, and Lennie Bailey, about 50 people enjoyed a beautiful birthday cake presented by the Auxiliary. Along with the cake the Auxiliary gave the Legion a much needed Post 770 flag. The old one had been repaired many times during numerous years and needed to be replaced. The highlight of the evening was a short talk given by each of the Boys Stater's. Benjamin Robertson, Tyler Murray, Calab Blass, and Daniel Sullivan told of their experiences during the week they attended Boys State at Morrisville last summer. Their presentations were absolutely wonderful. If a person had any doubts as to the direction the youth of today are taking, listening to their experiences would certainly have you thinking very positive about this program and our young students. It was a great evening. ...Our last two fish fries did quite well. About 140 attended the last Lenten fry put on by the Heroux crew near the end of March and about 150 came out for the regular Steak & Fish Fry dinner put on by the Colvin crew in April. Be sure you get out to enjoy the May fish fry on Friday the 9<sup>th</sup> because it appears it may be the last one until September. With only 3 crews to alternate and about 8 or 9 straight Friday fish fries during Lent, it seems our crews are getting "burned out". In the old Legion we never did have fish fries during the summer. There has also been some talk about doing away with the salad bar and replacing it with a premixed salad like we did years ago. What are your thoughts on the subject? ...Breakfast's have been doing wonderful, however we are sorry to say we cannot get anyone to put a crew together for a special Mothers Day breakfast. The Heroux's that head up our monthly breakfast will be away that weekend. Any ideas or volunteers? ...Also, we have heard that our rules state Bingo should not take place on holidays. In addition I'm not sure whom to thank besides Wayne Doane, Phil Colvin, and Jim Dew, but they and perhaps others have made wonderful wood plaques with names and information to be added to the ones we already have in the hallway. It seems we have used up all the space on the Past Commanders, Post Everlasting, and officers plaques. These will be great additions and will keep us up to date. Our library has many books and more promised by Izzy Duddleston and others when we can get the library better organized. We are happy to report that new glass doors have been ordered for the trophy case and the lock on the glass doors of the patch board in the lounge has finely been removed so that we can transfer the patches into the larger case. So it looks like things are coming along nicely. We can still use some volunteer help with many of these projects. ...One thing we haven't forgotten how to do is spending money. Just kidding! ### IN MEMORY OF THE FALLEN, SHARE A POPPY

The red poppy has been a symbol of the Auxiliary since the 1920's. The flower is held near and dear to the hearts of our veterans because of what it represents and because the veterans make the crepe paper flowers to help them with their rehabilitation. On Memorial Day and Veterans Day, Auxiliary members are spotted distributing poppies to the public in exchange for donations. The money that is donated helps provide financial assistance to veterans. "The poppy is about the men and women who served this country," said Diane Kelly, National Poppy Chairman. "Being in wartime now, men and women sacrifice so much for the United States. It is a way to say thank you." The story of the poppy begins long before the Auxiliary adopted the flower as a way to help veterans. The story began during WWI when a doctor and soldier, Lt. Col. John McCrae of the Canadian army, found out a friend of his died in battle. McCrae wrote one of the most famous war poems, **In Flanders Fields**, to honor those who sacrificed their lives in the line of duty. Every year, around Memorial Day, services are held in Flanders Fields to honor the more than 360 American servicemen buried in Waregem, Belgium. Some of the bloodiest battles of WWI took place in the areas of northern France and southwest Belgium known as Flanders. The British front line was determined to keep the Germans from traversing Flanders and Ypres river valley to reach the port of Calais in France. Troops from both sides were holed up in the Ypres salient, an outward projection of the battle line. Defending British troops were vulnerable on three sides; therefore this was a bloody and dangerous place for a soldier to be. The destruction from the battles in this area reached beyond the battlefield to the towns and roads of the area, and led to the demolition of buildings, roads and all plant life, leaving only mud. But the dormant poppy seeds were now exposed after the burial of the dead soldiers and in the spirit of 1915, red poppies flourished in Flanders Fields covering the newly dug graves. "When you give a poppy, you have the opportunity to tell the poppy story and raise awareness about our veterans and the Auxiliary," said Mary Davis, Past National Poppy Chairman. While the main distribution of poppies remains on Memorial Day and Veterans Day, Auxiliary members can work year round to educate their communities, especially youth, with the poppy story. "The poppy story provides the Auxiliary an opportunity to instill the significance of the flower, who veterans are and the importance of the work our veterans do," said Davis. "If the Auxiliary doesn't go out there and tell the story, it will be forgotten," said Kelly. "It is important to teach them and say that this is part of our veterans. This is a way to memorialize them."
