Doug proudly served in the US Navy as a boiler man on the USS Charles H Roan from November 1961 until the time of his honorable discharge in March of 1966. In 2004 Doug was diagnosed with mesothelioma. Members of the Trumansburg American Legion Post 770 funeral detail and the US Military Honors team performed a military honors tribute at Grove Cemetery following committal prayers.

## Rededication of War Memorials in DeWitt Park in Ithaca

Once a dirty park, now given a facelift to honor Vets. It was silent, save for the sound of traffic and a lone trumpet singing a song of lost soldiers. People young and old, in uniform and civilian clothes, sat respectfully in rows of fold-up chairs under a canopy of trees; those behind them waited with children on their shoulders, with small American flags in their hands or tucked into the pockets of their shirts. The grass was neatly clipped and free of tangled pieces of trash. The sight was a rare one for the DeWitt Park the city used to know – dark, dirty and often neglected. But Saturday revealed a park with freshly laid bricks, wreaths of red, white, and blue, granite scrubbed and cleaned so it sparkled under the sun. It was a day that Holly Hollingsworth and other volunteers on the Dewitt Park Restorations Committee had waited for seemingly forever. But after three years of volunteer work and donations, it came: a rededication of the veteran's memorials Hollingsworth said had almost been forgotten. "We used this for Memorial Day, Flag Day, and Veterans Day, and then the park kind of got forgotten. There was a lack of respect for the park," Hollingsworth said. "People didn't recognize the memorials, they skateboarded on them and used drugs and alcohol on them and climbed all over them. It's a disgrace if we just forget these guys." But the crowd of about 300 didn't forget as it gathered around the memorial circle for the morning ceremony. "These are not just names of stone you have seen or touched," the Rev James Henery, a veteran of the Coast Guard and also a former Navy Chaplain, said as he opened the ceremony. "These represent unfinished lives." Mayor Carolyn Peterson read a rededication of the memorial and handed it to Hollingsworth, declaring Oct 3<sup>rd</sup> Rededication Day. But she also took time to recognize Hollingsworth himself, reading a separate declaration that also named Oct 3<sup>rd</sup> Holly Hollingsworth Day. "It was a dream shared by many but pursued by few," Peterson said, in reference to the parks cleanup. "It wouldn't have been possible with out the cajoling, persuasion and persistence of

Holly.” Several organizations have responded to the committee’s calls for help during the last few years donating their time and materials to restore several aspects of the park. The Bricklayers Union re-laid brick walkways with three pallets of brick left over from West State Street Projects and repaired the memorials, sealing the bases with 15 bags of cement and 40 tubes of caulking. The American Legion Post 221 and Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War washed, painted and sealed benches and lampposts. The City provided mulch for the trees, which was put down by the Sons and Vietnam Veterans of America 377, and the city’s cleaning crew removed graffiti, and continues to do so as it’s found. Throughout the rest of the ceremony, speakers urged the community not to forget the veterans’ legacy. Leslyn McBean-Clairorne, a member of the Tompkins County Legislature, spoke about the first dedication of the WWI memorial on November 11, 1924, when the shops all closed at 1:00 PM so residents could view a parade and unveiling of the memorial.
